Consultation Statement

A Neighbourhood Plan for Daws Hill 2018-2033

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1. Purpose of Statement

This Consultation Statement has been prepared to fulfil the legal requirements of the Neighbourhood Planning regulations 2012.

Section 15(2) of the regulations sets out what a Consultation Statement should:

- contain details of the persons and bodies who were consulted about the proposed neighbourhood plan development;
- explain how they were consulted;
- summarise the main issues and concerns raised by the persons consulted;
- describe how these issues and concerns have been considered and, where relevant, addressed in the neighbourhood plan development.

The Daws Hill Neighbourhood Forum (DHNF) has involved residents, Ward Councillors, businesses and other stakeholders at key stages in the development of the Plan, such as:

- Zidentification of issues affecting the neighbourhood area;
- Policy development and appraisal;
- ?re-submission community-led consultation on the draft Plan.

The aims of our consultation have been to ensure the Plan was informed by the views of local residents and other stakeholders from the outset of the process in 2011.

2. Governance arrangements

The Committee of DHNF is made up of residents and resident representatives from the Resident Associations in the Neighbourhood Area (NA). DHNF comprises Daws Hill and Abbey Park Residents' Association (DHRA), School Close Road Association Limited (SCRAL), and Fair Ridge, The Spinney and Foxleigh Residents' Association (FSFRA). Committee members are nominated and voted in at the Annual General Meeting each year. Over the years the Committee membership has changed but has remained representative of the Neighbourhood Area (NA).

Membership of the DHNF is open to all residents in the NA and there has been regular recruitment activity, usually face to face on doorsteps, and substantial fund raising over the last 8 years.

The initial presentation of the Position Statement to residents took place in November 2011. This outlined all the issues that had been fed in from the Resident Associations and residents. The outcome of the meeting was to seek Neighbourhood Forum status in due course with the upcoming Localism Bill and to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan (NP).

An update meetings with residents in April, 2012, approved for the Neighbourhood Forum status and area to be applied for to Wycombe District Council (WDC) and to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan and led to the Terms of Reference being published on the website.

The Daws Hill Neighbourhood Forum status was officially designated by WDC on 25th September, 2012. The Forum was re-designated on 19th January, 2018, after the first 5 years designation period came to an end.

The existing Daws Hill Residents Association website was used initially to communicate information to residents and businesses and hold relevant documents for all in the NA. This website is now rebranded as the Daws Hill Neighbourhood Forum (DHNF) website.

At the residents meeting held 11th October, 2012 the Neighbourhood Forum was ratified by the residents by a unanimous vote. By a unanimous vote the assets (funds) of the Daws Hill Residents Association were transferred to the new DHNF.

Also at this meeting approval was given by a unanimous vote to seek a Judicial Review regarding the geographical area that should be in the NP. Our application included the Handy Cross sports centre and the RAF Daws Hill site (now Pinetrees) but Wycombe DC would not accept that these areas should be part of the NA.

This residents meeting in October, 2012, was attended by Steve Baker, MP, 7 Councillors, the High Wycombe Society, nearby Resident Associations and the Press.

Steve Baker, MP, also attended the last AGM of the DHNF on 24th March, 2018.

After the Judicial Review and subsequent appeal in February, 2014, the Daws Hill NA was eventually agreed at the reduced area without the Handy Cross sports centre and the RAF Daws Hill site.

Each Committee meeting has been minuted and key actions highlighted and shared on the website. The attendance of 15 to 20 Committee members at the frequent Committee meetings to review progress and the development and agreement of the Neighbourhood Plan detail has included the Ward Councillor and a representative of the High Wycombe Society, together with representatives of nearby Residents Associations.

3. Relationship with Wycombe District Council and Buckinghamshire County Council

Due to the difficulties of the Judicial Review and the disagreement about the Neighbourhood Area, the relationship with Wycombe District Council (WDC) has not been inclusive in the development of the NP until the post appeal period after February, 2014.

Penelope Tollitt, Head of Planning, WDC, in February, 2014, was met by representatives of the DHNF and she subsequently attended the DHNF Committee meeting in March, 2014, to impress on the NF the importance of the Localism Bill and local neighbourhood

planning to give the right input into the housing development and issue affecting the NA which can only come from Residents. WDC indicated that going forward assistance and financial help would be available for the Neighbourhood Plan.

Further to the positive meetings and guidance from the WDC officers, together with funding, the completion of the NP has been possible. The meetings between the DHNF Committee members and WDC staff were held in January, 2014, March and May, 2015, (David Dewar), September, October, November, 2016 (Aude Pantel) and more recently in June and September 2017 and subsequently March and April, 2018 (Charlotte Morris). Each of these meetings involved the review of the latest versions of the NP and provided suggestions for improvements to the plan. Outside of these meetings there has been various communications with WDC planners, usually by E mail.

Buckinghamshire County Council (BCC), Peter Hardy, attended the NF Committee meeting in April, 2012, to discuss the position statement produced by the NF and the traffic issues. There has been ongoing consultation by the NF with BCC regarding the Southern Quadrant Transport Strategy produced by Jacobs. It is now understood that a new transport strategy is to be developed by BCC for the whole of High Wycombe.

A positive outcome from the call in of the Daws Lea bus link by BCC has confirmed the importance of continuing to forge a good relationship with BCC.

One Councillor has been ever present at the Committee and other consultation meetings and has reviewed the draft Plan in its entirety ahead of the pre-submission consultation.

4. Drafting Policies

The Policy drafting in 2014 was drawn-up from a variety of sources, and seek to influence planning and development outcomes in order that they help to achieve a common vision for the DHNA. Our policies have been formulated from the input and output from the Daws Hill Reference Group Workshops held in 2012, our Daws Hill RA and DHNF Committee meetings and Neighbourhood Plans from other areas, and have been evaluated and prioritised by the NA residents in meetings and through an on-line survey.

A number of meetings have been held with bodies, such as Developers, Bucks County Council and Thames Water to understand the infrastructure issues in the NA and surrounding locations that could affect the NA.

All the information gathered from these consultations led to iterations of plans in 2012/2013 when not much guidance was available of the format of a NP. These plans were generally drafted by working teams from the DHNF Committee.

Consultants funded by Residents and grants assisted in the production of some of the key areas such as traffic management, the area character assessment and the overall development of the NA.

5. Policy Review for Residents and Businesses Events

The policies have been presented to residents and businesses at the AGM meetings in October 2013, October 2014, November 2015, February 2017, and March, 2018. At each meeting the residents and businesses were asked to confirm their agreement to the NP policies and the plan contents before further progressing to the next stage.

A key requirement was the formal Regulation 14 pre-submission consultation on the draft NP. From 25th June until 5th August 2018, the draft NP was displayed at the libraries at High Wycombe and Flackwell Heath and at the WDC offices. A flier was letter

dropped to all businesses and residents in the NA informing of this and the method of recording of any comments.

The purpose was to give as many residents and stakeholders the opportunity to become familiar with the contents of the Draft Plan and to comment upon it.

The names of all the stakeholders consulted are listed in below. A list of the households in the NA has not been published.

6. Results of the Pre-submission Consultations

In accordance with the list of Statutory Bodies to be consulted provided by Wycombe DC, a total of 41 notifications were sent out to the following:-

No responses were received from residents or businesses in the Neighbourhood Area that required amendments to the NP.

7. Relationships with Developers

The DHNF has undertaken some pre-application consultation with developers, particularly on the Daws Hill RAF site, which although not in the reduced NA is adjacent to the NA and potentially has a major impact on the residents in NA.

This involvement has included:

- Dattendance at planning development brief meetings with WDC planning
- attendance at consultation events and meetings with the developers
- discussing proposals at the DNF Committee meeting
- Isharing information with residents via e mail, the website and residents meetings
- 2 making formal representations in writing to both the developer and the Planning

When planning application was submitted DHNF Committee members have spoken at the WDC Planning Committee.

The knowledge and experience gained from this activity has fed into the drafting of the policies.
